What Is A Biopsy?

A "Biopsy" is the removal of a small sample of a growth on the skin by your dermatologist. The sample is then sent to the pathologist, a doctor who examines this sample under a microscope and renders a diagnosis regarding the type of growth or disease present.

Your doctor then reviews the pathologist's findings and coordinates that with his/her observation of your condition. Knowing the type of growth or disease helps your doctor to determine the best possible way to treat you. It generally takes up to 14 working days for the pathology results on paraffin sections to be returned. Should there be a problem that requires a change in treatment or additional surgery for cancerous roots, we will call you. As a note all our surgical procedure are done at our Hilton Head office. If you are curious as to your results otherwise, please contact us at your convenience.

These are the charges when a biopsy is performed:

- 1. The dermatologist for removal of the tissue to be examined, and
- 2. The pathologist for microscopic evaluation of the tissue (billed on a different date), and
- 3. The laboratory for preparation of the microscopic slide.

The biology of your lesion, whether malignant or not, will <u>not</u> significantly change in 14 days.

Care Of Biopsy Site

- 1. Keep wound dry for the first 24 hours.
- 2. Wash your hands with soap and water.
- 3. Remove the dressing.
- 4. Cleanse the biopsy site with hydrogen peroxide for the first two days.
- 5. Thoroughly dry the area and apply a small amount of antibiotic ointment (Polysporin, Bacitracin, triple antibiotic ointment or similar wound ointment).
- 6. Place a small dressing or band-aid over the wound changing twice daily until the wound is healed usually 1 week.
- 7. Should bleeding occur, apply firm constant pressure for 20 minutes.

Studies show that wounds heal better when covered with ointment and a dressing.
