EXCISIONAL SURGERY PREOPERATIVE INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Eat a light breakfast or lunch the day of surgery. You may have decaffeinated coffee, juice and toast.
- 2. Take your regularly prescribed medications. Aspirin and Aspirincontaining medications (Alka Seltzer, Decongestants, Anacin, Advil, Motrin or Bufferin) should not be taken 7 10 days prior to surgery. Please let us know upon receiving this checklist if you are taking other arthritis medicine, pain relievers or blood thinners. If a physician has placed you on the Aspirin, please let us know so that we might discuss this with him or her. Please continue to take your other regularly prescribed medications.
- 3. If you need an antibiotic prior to surgical procedures or dental work, please make the necessary arrangements with your physician to order it.
- 4. Please do not drink any alcoholic beverages three days prior to your surgery. Alcohol aggravates bleeding problems.
- 5. Please do not smoke one week prior to the surgery. Smoking and blood levels of nicotine can interfere with wound healing.
- 6. Please call our office if you get sick between now and the time of your surgery or if you have any additional questions.
